In June 2020, we sent a parent survey to gain perspective and insight on the possibility of on-site learning, hybrid learning or complete digital learning (current and incoming families). We also surveyed staff. Among the questions we asked about concerns, problems, and other information they wanted us to know and consider.

Frequent communication and opportunities for families and school staff to provide input have continued throughout the 2020-21 school year. Thorough information about our current reopening plan has been shared with the community. Multiple options (in-person and digital) are being made available in response to families' needs. Valley Catholic School is in regular communication with our county LPHA for guidance and plan approvals.

Many families have chosen to keep their students home for the time being. We will continue to provide our full Comprehensive Distance Learning platform with a designated teacher for one class of distance learners at every grade level.

Academic

- Subjects taught and minutes of instruction align with ODEs guide.
- Students have synchronous instruction about half of the minutes.
- Grades are given for all required subject areas.
- Feedback is given regularly on student work, progress reports and report cards.
- Late or missing work is communicated to parents weekly.

Operational

- Student attendance is taken daily
- Virtual activities are being offered (parents can sign up)

Student and Family Support

- We have given a technology survey and have provided devices for students who do not have their own.
- Our school counselor regularly attends classroom synchronous sessions, and works with individual students and families as needed or wanted.
- We are remaining flexible with parent needs as best as we can.
- Our parent network continues to assist in building community with virtual student/family events outside of the required school day.

Digital Learning Needs

- Students use their own device or be given one by the school to use
- All classes use GSuite to assign and store student work.
- Teachers use Zoom (executive level) or Google Meets for synchronous instruction.
- Generally, digital content includes: google docs assignments, IXL, Journeys, MyMath, youtube, self-created videos, and Readworks.
 - Teachers have received training based on their needs. We assessed training needs and offered professional development on: google, zoom, digital content, and assessments.

We will utilize distance learning through November 6, 2020 (the first academic quarter). Prior to November, we will assess the Washington County metrics for reopening. If the metrics support reopening, we will move to our on-site plan. If the metrics do not meet criteria, we will continue distance learning.

On January 25, 2021, Comprehensive Distance Learning is shifting to an optional instructional method available to those students who are not ready to return to the classroom. Beginning on this date, the school is phasing into an On-Site Learning model as our primary option.

Specialty classes will be taught in the classroom to a stable group (instead of a dedicated, but shared room, i.e. the music room). Specialty classes may also take place outside (i.e. PE) in a larger area, when applicable. • Students will be taught about proper distancing, handwashing, bathroom procedures during the first weeks of school, and continuing throughout the year as needed. • Hallways will contain distancing signage, along with a one-way signage to establish directional flow patterns. • Staff will be trained in procedures and protocols by school administration, along with cleaning procedures and symptoms of COVID to be aware of by local, medical professionals prior to in-person learning. Trainings will likely be virtual, but if in person, social distance guidelines will be followed. • Upon learning of a confirmed COVID-19 case, we will notify the LPHA immediately (via phone), as well as the school community (via email). We will follow any quarantine and closure requirements given by the LPHA. • Disinfection will include end of day cleaning by a custodial team to all classrooms and common areas. Bathrooms and high frequency touch points will be cleaned by daytime custodial staff throughout the day. Activity areas (playground, outdoor areas) will be disinfected between each cohort group by the school staff. At the end of the day these areas will be sanitized again by the custodial staff. • We will comply with all requirements of the LPHA, including surrendering contact tracing logs, when needed. • Students and staff will be screened daily upon arrival, by answering health screening questions (students) and having temperature taken by thermometer (both students and staff) before entering the facility. Staff will be trained on monitoring for additional symptoms. • Students or staff who present with symptoms upon entry will not be admitted to the building. Students or staff who discover symptoms throughout the day will be isolated in an area and monitored until they are picked up by a parent/guardian. • Daily cohort tracing logs will be kept for each classroom. A shared google doc will exist for each room. Teachers will manage keeping the data for their students, and staff will record their own presence in any classroom they enter or encounter (outside, etc.). An additional log will be kept in the office for any adult who enters the building, but not necessarily to interact with a cohort group (maintenance staff, etc.) • The shared docs will record the entire week in one doc, and will be saved as a PDF when the week ends. All docs will be saved for at least a rolling four weeks, and will be shared with the LPHA immediately upon request. • LPHA will be contacted ASAP upon a confirmed case, and we will fully cooperate with required disinfecting, cleaning and contact tracing guidelines. • In an outbreak situation, we will comply with the LPHA to limit or close the physical school, or utilize digital learning for specific cohorts, for a specified time.
